

## How to Write a **Tricube** Poem

The prefix "tri" means three. A tricube is a poem that has three stanzas. Each stanza has three lines. Each line has three syllables.

The poem "Each Scar" by Baptiste Paul is an example of a tricube.





## Try a tricube—in three steps!

- 1. Think up a topic and brainstorm words, feelings, or experiences to describe it.
- 2. Write 1-5 sentences that describe the feeling or experience. Count the syllables in your sentences to see how close you are to having 27 syllables (3x3x3, or 3³).
- 3. Break what you've written into three parts. Delete or swap out words (a thesaurus can help) until you've got exactly three stanzas with three lines each, and three words per line.
